## Requirements for the Major in Philosophy (14 Classes total)

Students majoring in philosophy must complete all the courses in Introductions and in Inquiries. Every student must also complete four additional upper division (100-level) elective courses.

Students who wish to graduate with a specific emphasis (or emphases) must select four upper division courses listed within that emphasis. Inquiries courses may count toward an emphasis.
